Stephanie Wrobel debuts with "Darling Rose Gold," a propulsive novel about the fractured relationship between a mother and daughter. Rose Gold Watts spent her first eighteen years believing that she was seriously ill with a mystery disease that defied all diagnoses. Five years later, Rose Gold's mother, Patty, is out of jail and determined to reconcile with the daughter she duped and purposefully sickened. But Rose Gold's idea of reconciliation might not match Patty's...

Therese Ann Fowler's "A Good Neighborhood" tells the story of another mother struggling in her relationship with her child. Valerie Alston-Holt's son is preparing to leave for college in the fall when he falls for the new next door neighbor right as tensions are building between their families and in the neighborhood at large. Can these families figure out what it means to be a good neighbor before it is too late?

Marion Lafournier is struggling to find meaning in a small town on an Ojibwe reservation in northern Minnesota in "This Town Sleeps" by Dennis Staples. Late one night he accidentally brings to life a dog from underneath the elementary school playground, which leads him to the grave of an Ojibwe basketball star who was murdered at seventeen. Marion investigates the young man's mysterious death and finds connections to his own family and an old Ojibwe legend. Staples' debut is highly anticipated.

Roza and her daughter, Shira, must hide from Nazi soldiers in an old barn. Shira struggles to stay quiet day after day, so Roza tells her the story of an enchanted garden in which a golden bird sings whatever music a silenced princess composes in her head. Roza's stories work for a while, but there comes a time when she makes the hardest choice in order to secure her daughter's future. "The Yellow Bird Sings" by Jennifer Rosner is inspired by the true stories of Jewish children hidden during WWII.

In Peter Swanson's "Eight Perfect Murders," Malcolm Kershaw, bookseller and mystery enthusiast, has long kept a list of the genre's best (and nearly unsolvable) murders. Fiction bleeds into real life when an FBI agent knocks on Malcolm's door looking for information about a series of murders that closely resemble those on Malcolm's list, making him a possible suspect. Malcolm, desperate to prove his innocence, starts his own investigation while the murderer continues their killing spree. As Malcolm grows closer to the truth the killer closes in. The suspense itself might be too much!
